

**2025 Shop Hop quilt and participating quilt shops in Alaska:** I pulled this information from another quilt store's newsletter and wanted to share it.

Northern Threads in Fairbanks has introduced the Alaska Quilter's Shop Hop 2025 quilt which showcases a new pattern by Marie Noah. The Last Frontier quilt includes 14 unique wildlife block kits and one finishing kit. The Shop Hop Event runs from May 1 through August 31, 2025 at independent brick-and-mortar quilt shops that are open for regular hours during the event dates.

Both of our local quilt shops are participating: Changing Tides is offering the Grizzly Bear block, and RainTree Quilting has the Sea Otter block. Both stores will also have a supply of the finishing kits which include the Arctic Swan block. There has been a delay in the arrival of some of the fabric for the finishing kit, and they're hoping to have them shipped out by early July.

Blocks must be ordered from the participating stores. Both the Changing Tides' Grizzly Bear block and RainTree's Sea Otter block are beautiful and are hanging in the stores.





# **GUILD COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS: Pillowcases and comfort quilts**

**Pillowcases:** Shannon Dilley currently heads up our pillowcase project. We regularly donate to AWARE, JYC (incarcerated youth), Housing First and the Pioneer Home. We have pillowcase kits upstairs at the church or you can make some from your stash. The burrito method is a tried and true method with instructions on our website. We hope to soon sponsor a class on making pillowcases by serger/overlocker. Please keep in mind that our website states all pillowcases must have encased/closed seams ... so little (or big) fingers can't pull them apart.

**Comfort quilts:** Judy Morley continues to keep us on track with comfort quilts for area cancer patients. Like the pillowcase kits, we have kits of fabric upstairs at the church with 3-yard patterns enclosed. You can take a kit and make one of the 3-yard quilts in just a few hours, or you're welcome to raid your stash to put something together on your own. Generally, a comfort quilt is a lap quilt that is 50ish inches by 60ish inches, but Judy accepts both larger and smaller quilt tops for quilting and donating. The Guild supplies the batting and backing. Judy quilts the tops and returns them to us at a membership meeting where one of us takes our quilt (or someone else's) to bind and label.

**UFOs:** UFO = UnFinished Object. It could be large. It could be small. It could be something you recently made. Or it could be that very first real quilt that I made in 2014 that still needs to be quilted, bound and labeled. It could even be that finished quilt that still needs a label!

Sandra Bleicher is in charge of UFO contracts again this year. To encourage us to finish those UFOs, we need to fill out the UFO form which is on our website and return half of the form to Sandra. When we finish an item, we need to show it to Sandra or bring it to a meeting for Show and Tell where we can all celebrate that it is finished. All completed UFOs are entered into a drawing at the end of the contract time (September meeting). To date, Sandra has only two completed UFO contracts ... both hers. We need to give her a run for the drawing and enter some of our own UFOs.

Oh. If we don't finish that UFO by September? We pay the Guild whatever amount we pledged on our contract(s).

**SOV Food Bank:** Please remember to bring food to Shepherd of the Valley's food bank when you come to our meetings. Our rent use of the meeting room and upstairs storage is reduced with the expectation that we will provide at least \$50 worth of food to the food bank each month. Attending members have been doing quite well with contributions. It would be wonderful for members who are not able to attend meetings, but still have the benefit of our space rental, to contribute occasionally. Ann puts a lunch box on the front table during meetings for donations that she then turns over to the church.

**CCQ Zipper Pulls:** The beautiful enamel zipper pulls from William Spear are available in blue or black. They will be sold to CCQ members for \$15 each at CCQ Business Meetings.

# **MINUTES TO 5-17-25 MEETING**

The meeting was canceled as Dixie was the only board member able to attend.

#### FEED SACK TOTE BAG INSTRUCTIONS

#### REPURPOSED FEED SACK INSTRUCTIONS

The best feed sacks are those holding horse or poultry grains, as well as bird feed. Dog or cat feed has fat added so are not ideal but if you clean them enough with hot, soapy water, they should work. They may, however, retain a "meaty" smell. Calrose rice bags make great bags. Old tarps work well too but you will need to add side seams.

Remove top and bottom strings and thoroughly clean and dry your sack. A kiddie pool or a bathtub work best. Immerse entire sack and remove all dust and debris. (NOTE: This is a messy process, so I usually do this outside on a hot sunny day using a kiddie pool. Also, the crinkling of the bags is very noisy so making these bags while others are napping or watching TV is not the best idea. Ask me how I know!)

Use a DULL needle and a DULL rotary cutter. This is perfect for ransacking your sharps you have discarded or before you replace either. Set your machine for a long stitch. I generally use 3-3.5". I also like my #10 Bernina foot for sewing my bag edges, but it is not necessary. Clips are also handy! I refer to "small bags" as those that contain 20 lbs and "large" as those holding 40-50 lbs.

1. Once the bag has been thoroughly cleaned and is dry, cut off two 3" strips. Choose the end of the bag that won't interfere with the design you want on the front of the bag. Keep in mind you will lose 2" at the top for the seam and roughly 4" at the base. I usually take one strap from the top and the other from the bottom. You can cut off the string holes being sewn in, but I don't. I find I lose too much of the bag making it less deep. I want a big bag!




- 2. Trim the 3" strips to your desired size. Most of mine are 20". You can make the straps shorter, but I like to sling my bags over my shoulder. However, if they are too long, they will drag when you are carrying them. The length is your preference!
- 3. Fold strips inward as if you are making a folded bias. Sew each side and set aside.



4. Turn bag inside out (design will be inside now) and roll edge twice 1" toward the wrong side of the bag.



- 5. Using a ruler and a marker, mark two dots 4" (small bag) or 6" (large bag) from each side of bag.
- 6. Insert straps of bag so that the dots are on the outside. Take care to make sure the handles do not twist and are inserted so that straps will be correct.



7. Fold straps upward and clip.



The area where the straps are inserted needs to be reinforced. You can choose how to sew the seams holding the straps, but I usually sew using this method. You can also sew the area holding the strap with an X.





8. Measure up 1" from bottom of bag and sew two lines across.



9. Box corners of bag by pushing out corners to make a triangle. Once done, turn right side out.



- 10. The base size of the bag is dictated by where you draw the line and the size of the feed sack. I prefer 4-7" (I use 6-7" for large bags and 4" for small bags). Hint: A 7" box will give you a large enough base to hold two project container bins using a large bag.
- 11. Turn right side out and your bag is ready to use! These bags are great for SE Alaska's wet environment and are perfect for boating or holding large quilts. They carry more groceries in weight than you probably will be able to carry! Remember, every bag you make is a bag saved from a landfill.
