FEBRUARY CLASS: Moravian Star class after the meeting! Here is Mindy's supply list for the Moravian Star. You will need to bring:

Cardboard, I have used cardboard from the back of planner calendars and note pads, cereal and cracker boxes work too.

Pen or pencil

Quilting ruler, 2" wide is good with marking for 60 degrees

An iron, any iron will do, I prefer my clover mini iron

Scissors for cardboard

Scissors for fabric

Rotary cutter and mat

Ironing mat

A six inch piece of ribbon or twine

Hand needles

Thread, (I like to use wool if I'm using wool fabric)

Heat glue, I use heat and bond 5/8" heat tape, Joann's carries it. If I buy the 5/8" I can cut my pieces lengthwise in 4 strips, this saves money. You can use fabric glue, you just have to be careful not to get the glue all the way to the edge of the fabric or you won't be able to get your needle in the fabric.

You need 60 60 degree diamond cardboard and batting pieces. 4" x 2.5" 60 pieces of wool 6" x 3.5" or larger

I have cut out several cardboard and batting pieces to give to people that want to make Moravian Stars, if you email me that you are interested, I will bring enough for each person that emails.

For the wool, or any fabric, you can use 60 different colored pieces, or just several different colored pieces or all one fabric, it is your choice. There are 12 5 pointed stars sewn together, 6 for each half. I will have some wool that people can use, not enough for every diamond so bring what you have.

This is a great project to use up small batting scraps.

Ree Nancarrow: Sharing the World I Know



December 6, 2024 - March 15, 2025

Sharing the World I Know is a new solo exhibition featuring quilt works by Fairbanks art quilter Ree Nancarrow.

For 50 years, Nancarrow watched a small tundra pond outside her window called Deneki Lakes. She tracked the shifting habitat at the lake as the water level dropped over time. Fewer species live there now.

In 2010, Nancarrow started working with scientists through a program called In a Time of Change, which supports collaboration across the environmental arts, humanities, and sciences in Alaska. She explains how this collaboration informed her work: "The knowledge and deeper understanding of the natural world gained from working with these scientists has changed how I see the world, and how I describe it visually. That knowledge and concern for the world I live in led me to tell stories of climate change such as wildland fire, permafrost melt, development of greenhouse gases, bark beetle infestations, and creation of methane bubbles."

She makes her quilts with custom-printed fabric. The fabric features images and designs she has collected and created over her art career. She sews them together and quilts each piece with intricate designs, enhancing their rich imagery and detail.

Both the exhibit opening and lecture are free. The exhibit runs through March 15, 2025.






















President Ann called the meeting to order at 10:35 am. We met quorum (needed 20 today).

Guests: Laurie's daughter-in-law Shannon Adamson, and new member Stephanie Allison were introduced.

Zoom: We had technical difficulties and finally were able to login after 10:40.

Minutes: The November minutes were approved as written.

Treasurer's report: Debbie gave her Treasurer's report; see the end of the minutes. There were no questions. Debbie said her status has changed, and she will be in Wasilla for at least the next year and a half.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Heather Ramseth. (5)

UFO: Sandra Bleicher is not here, but we reviewed UFOs for new members. These are projects that you may have had in hiding that have never been finished. If interested, the member fills out the form (on the website) and submits it to Sandra with the amount pledged filled in. If the item is finished by the due date (usually October), the member's name is entered into a drawing. If the item remains unfinished, the member pays her pledged amount to the Guild.

FOOD BANK: Ann pointed out the lunch box here at the front table where we collect money for the church's food bank. Our rent is kept low by our donations (food or funds) to the food bank.

COMFORT QUILTS: Judy Morley had a previous engagement and stopped to pick up finished quilts and new tops before the meeting. Ann scored a roll of 124" x 30 yard batting from JoAnn's and is trying to get another roll. Judy was able to retrieve the roll from Ann's car. Ann is trying to get a wholesale card from The Warm Company and is waiting for her wholesale card from the city. Ann ordered four rolls of backing wholesale. One tote in the back is full of flannel; the other has cut quilt kits. If you take a kit with a Fabric Café pattern, do not cut their binding as it is single fold. Do the normal double fold binding. Alexander asked about the binding on other patterns; Ann wasn't sure what is specified. She asked that we not cut the specified 1.75" in the Fabric Café pattern. Sandi said she has done many Fabric Café patterns. Marcie has one quilt top from Judy that needs binding.

Ann Marie asked if we would be interested in donating comfort quilts to Ashville, NC. She will be going there soon. Ann said her knee jerk reaction is to say she doesn't know how many quilts we have available; she will check with Judy. Southern California is now in the same boat with their fires. She noted that for a while no one was making comfort quilts except Judy.

Member participation has dropped significantly. She added that the three-yard quilts can be made in an "afternoon".

Nancy Krehlik asked if the Red Cross is asking for anything. Ann said they were good the last time she talked to them. She will call again. Sandi said she is on the board and will check; she thinks there is a new person in the office. Today, quilt kits have been picked up, and finished quilts were brought in.

PILLOWCASES: Shannon Dilley reported that we do not need pillowcases at this time. Neither Aware nor the Pioneer Home needed any last month, and Housing First only took two. The holiday pillowcases are still available for next year. We also have kits ready to be sewn. The committee is Shannon and Debbie Germain. Debbie said Shannon took on this project in the short term which has turned into long term.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

CHRISTMAS PARTY: It was FUN!!! It always is a great event. It is hoped that people took home some treasures. Thank you to everyone for donating items and for bringing food. We made over \$1000.

AUDIT: (Namee Ericksen arrived.) The audit has not yet happened as Dixie snoozed and then left town. Laurie has had to drop out; Marné has a new job with the legislature, and Mindy can meet on evenings and weekends. Stephanie Allison volunteered to replace Laurie. Dixie will contact the library about their meeting rooms.

NEW BUSINESS:
